Cheeky Walter by [Lynne Rowe](#) loves nothing more than roaming the ocean deep in search of his favourite accompaniment to his fishy meals – chips, of course! Use the blue and white shades from your Snuggle kit to create this sturdy toy which little ones will love to grip and play with.

clever**

Learn how to double
crochet two together
by following the
illustration on page 62

stitches used

Chain (ch)
Double crochet (dc)
Double crochet two together (dc2tog)

SIZE

Length: 19cm
 Height: 10cm

Walter whale

tail fin

* Using 4mm hook and Soft Blue make a magic ring, work 6dc into ring. Six sts

Rnd 1: 1dc in each st to end

Rnd 2: (2dc in next st, 2dc) to end. Eight sts

Rnd 3: (2dc in next st, 3dc) to end. Ten sts

Rnd 4: (2dc in next st, 4dc) to end. 12 sts

Rnd 5: rep Rnd 1

Rnd 6: (dc2tog, 1dc) to end. Eight sts *

Fasten off, set aside

Rep from * to * to make second Tail Fin

Hold second Tail Fin in

your right hand, hold first Tail Fin in your left

hand adjacent to second

Tail Fin, join them as follows:

Rnd 1: working around eight sts of first Tail Fin

3dc, dc2tog, 3dc,

working around second

Tail Fin 3dc, dc2tog, 3dc.

14 sts

Rnd 2: 2dc, dc2tog, 6dc, dc2tog, 2dc. 12 sts

Rnds 3-5: 1dc in each st to end

Rnd 6: 2dc, dc2tog, 4dc,

dc2tog, 2dc. Ten sts

Rnds 7-9: rep Rnds 3-5

Stuff Tail and Fins. Hold

open edge of Tail tog,

lining up ten sts (five on

each side), work 5dc

across both sets of sts

to join

Fasten off

side fin

Make two

Using 4mm hook and Soft Blue make a magic ring, work 6dc into ring. Six sts

Pull magic ring closed

Rnd 1: 2dc in each st to end. 12 sts

Rnds 2-3: 1dc in each st to end

Rnd 4: (dc2tog, 1dc) to end. Eight sts

Fasten off

head

Using 4mm hook and Sailor Blue make 5ch

* **Rnd 1:** 2dc in second ch from hook, 2dc, 3dc in

next ch, turn, work along opposite side of ch as follows: 2dc, 1dc in

same place as first 2dc. Ten sts

Note: place st marker

at end of Rnd 1, move marker up after each rnd

Rnd 2: 2dc in each st to end. 20 sts

Rnd 3: (1dc, 2dc in next



st) to end. 30 sts

Rnd 4: 1dc in each st to end

Rnd 5: (2dc, 2dc in next st) to end. 40 sts

Rnd 6: rep Rnd 4

Rnd 7: (3dc, 2dc in next st) to end. 50 sts *

Rnds 8-16: rep Rnd 4 nine times, changing to Soft Blue during last dc of Rnd 14

Join Tail as follows:

Rnd 17: hold straight edge of Tail against top of Head (Tail Fins will be pointing to left), lining up

five sts of Tail with first five sts of next rnd, 5dc into Body and Tail

sts at same time, cont to work 1dc in each st to end, one sl st in next st

Fasten off

Catch Tail with a few sts to first rnd of Soft Blue so it points upright

base

Using 4mm hook and Milky White make 5ch

Rep from * to * of Head. 50 sts

to make up

Hold Base, with RS facing, against Rnd 17 of Head (Head will be upside down). Cont in

Milky White join Base to Head as follows: insert hook into back loop only of next st on Base then

insert hook into front loop only of st that sits at base of left side of Tail, yoh, pull back

through two loops and through st on hook (one sl st made), * insert hook into back loop only of next st on Base then

insert hook into front loop only of next st of Head, yoh, pull back

through two loops and through st on hook, rep from * all around,

leaving a small gap for stuffing. Stuff very firmly then cont to sl st seam closed

Fasten off

Sew Side Fin to each side of Body along lower edge. Cut out four white 1.5cm felt circles and two black 0.5cm circles. *

Sew black felt to centre of one white circle then whip stitch a second circle of white felt to back of eye. Rep from * for second eye.

Slip st eyes in place on front of Head. Use Sailor Blue to sew a mouth between eyes
